



Andy Graham scoring, Josh Gentles putting Alloa into the lead, Aaron Brown putting an equaliser late on into the top corner and with the dying breaths of the game Morgyn Neill rising

EXUBERANCE OF YOUTH

Is it me or are Alloa's loanees getting younger? The September signings of 18 year old pair Tyrece McDonnell and Scott Honeyman (both have since turned 19 after joining the club) have been supplemented in the lanuary transfer window by 17 year olds Charlie Dewar and Josh Gentles. I see it as a great compliment to the Wasps that the parent clubs of these players trust Alloa to give these fledgling players their maiden steps in a first team environment where results really matter, away from the sometimes comfortable environment of academy or 'B' team games.

Perhaps the ever younger age of loanees is a signal of bigger clubs realising the benefits of players encountering a different set of surroundings as part of their development as soon as possible, and also partly a realisation of where Alloa are in the pecking order at present for loans. When the Wasps are riding high in the Championship, which has been the case in six of the past twelve seasons, the club can attract what I'd term 'premium' loan players, a kind of final finishing school for players before they make their mark in the first teams of their parent clubs, or are sold on. Typically these players are in their early twenties, so are far more physically developed than your normal 17 or 18 year old. These players are often in their second or third loan spell, so are already well-versed in the mindset and logistics around a temporary

transfer, so all the conditions are in place for them to really hit the ground running with the Wasps. Take the 2018/19 season as an example, Dario Zanatta had already been on loan at Oueen's Park and Raith before his season with the Wasps. while Jake Hastie and Liam Burt had spent the previous season with Airdrie and Dumbarton respectively. However, when the Wasps are in League One, it is less likely that the Wasps can recruit experienced loan players and instead it will be Alloa who are the first step in the development of a young player. As Craig Levein would say, it's iust the 'natural order' of things. This season that is the case for first-time loanees McDonnell. Dewar and Gentles, with

Honeyman being the exception having already spent two spells on loan at East Stirlingshire from Falkirk (as an aside, it must be a rare occurrence for a loan player to still play their home games on their own ground, with the Shire also playing at the Falkirk Stadium!).

Whilst taking a loan player for their first loan is a riskier signing, as you never know how a young player will adapt away from their home comforts, that's not to sav a first loan cannot be successful. You only need to point to Bobby Wales and Ethan Sutherland last season to illustrate that exuberance of youth that some players show, producing phenomenal performances on their first temporary moves. The fact that Wales is now playing and scoring regularly in the first team at Kilmarnock, with him being touted for another upward move such has been his progress (which is no surprise for any Alloa supporter who saw his obvious promise last season), will only help attract other clubs to put their faith in Alloa to trust them with their prized assets. Sutherland of course has taken a different route, earning a increasingly common move down south to Wolves, where he's been playing for the Wanderers U23 side before a loan switch to National League side Solihull Moors last month.

Encouragingly, both Dewar and Gentles, despite their tender ages, have got off to highly promising starts in their first month in Clackmannanshire. Dewar is demonstrating remarkable maturity in the heart of the Wasps backline. While his willingness to drop a shoulder and move forward with the ball has perhaps been the most eye-catching feature of his games so far, I'd personally also

say that his defensive duels have been just as good, showing pace on the recovery and embracing the physicality of League One too. In addition, he has shown flexibility by seamlessly switching from playing right-centre-back as part of a back four, to the left hand side of a 3-man central defence for the final hour of the match at Montrose and enjoying a battle with fellow Dundee United Ioanee Owen Stirton throughout.

Gentles meanwhile has already got off the mark with his equaliser at Dumbarton in his maiden starting appearance for the club. In doing so, at 17 years and 129 days old, Josh became Alloa's youngest goalscorer since Scott Hynd's strike at Arbroath in May 2013. In-fact, Gentles became the Wasps' third youngest goalscorer since the turn of the Millennium with his strike at the Rock, with my table on this page showing Alloa's other youngster goalscorers in the past quarter of a century - the Rangers loanee is in some good company with his current Alloa team-mate Luke Rankin and fellow loanees

Ethan Sutherland and Tony Stevenson (with his penalty in the inaugural play-offs back in 2006 being totally nerveless). However, Gentles was far older than Scott Hynd's record breaking first goal and Greig Spence's first goal for the Wasps as a 16 year old at Hampden, with his mop of blond hair still fondly remembered!

Gentles backed that goal up with the pre-assist in the move for Cammy O'Donnell's thunderbolt at Montrose (with some good hold up play to feed Taggart, who in-turn teed up Cammy) and an assist of sorts for Steven Buchanan's goal at Links Park too. Although it was something of a mis-kick, it fell perfectly for Buchanan to head home and it still counts as a goal contribution for the Wales U18 international! A fortnight ago, it was Gentles' fine run, breezing past Tam O'Ware like he wasn't there, and cut-back which forced Kelty defender Callum Flatman into an own goal. Last weekend, Gentles swept home his second goal for the Wasps, putting Alloa ahead for the first time in the

topsy-turvy last-gasp 4-3 win at Annan. So, in my book, that's two goals and two assists so far for the highly promising Gentles in the first four starting appearances of his loan deal. By any standards that's a noteworthy return, but when you consider he's the youngest player in League One this season, it really has been an encouraging start for the Rangers prospect.

Andy Graham has been refreshingly willing to give youth a chance since taking up the reigns at the Recs, stating at the Q&A session with season ticket holders last September that "I'm more than willing to give them (youngsters) opportunities - age isn't a thing for me, it's about quality that you're bringing and what you're producing on a Tuesday, Thursday and a Saturday." As well as signing a number of young loan players, Andy has also helped to enhance Alloa's own production line of talent by contributing to the club bringing in a Wasps U20 squad to reduce the gap between the U18 team and the Alloa first team. In addition to trailblazers Cammy O'Donnell and Steven Buchanan, this season Luke Rankin has become a regular in the first team after a series of cameos in the 2022/23 campaign and a successful loan of his own at East Stirling last season. Reece Mullen is another who has been given his first minutes this season after being an unused sub seven times in 2023/24, before ending the campaign on loan at Camelon Juniors. Mullen hasn't let anyone down with his three starts so far this season and his calmness on the ball in the midfield battleground has been clear to see. Most recently Lewis Bruin has been the latest youth team player to make his first team debut, with the diminutive midfielder appearing as a late substitute in January's home draw with Queen of the South. Bruin, who I understand the Wasps signed from Airdrie, has obviously caught Andy's eye with the U20's training prior to the first team during the week, and also first hand alongside the first team manager in Alloa's Stirlingshire Cup encounters this season too.

The ultimate goal is for the Wasps to become more self-sufficient, nurturing our own youth team players without so much of a reliance on borrowing the best youngsters from the top academies in the country for the first team. That is obviously a long-term ambition and will not happen overnight, but it is at least promising that the first team manager has taken positive steps in introducing measures to bridge the gap. By improving the pathway and integrating young local talent into the first team environment, it can only be beneficial for everyone involved.

Andy's stance is to be applauded, bucking the trend of the regular press reports of young players getting fewer first-team

minutes season by season. That's an unsurprising trend from my standpoint, given the context of the pressures of the notoriously cut-throat world of football management. It seems to me that at every level of the game results dictate your future and nowadays a manager is seemingly never more than one bad run of half a dozen defeats away from the sack. Given the lifespan of a manager at a club is ever shortening, it's little wonder managers tend to rely on experienced players (arguably Andy did turn to experience during half-time at Galabank last weekend!) and is therefore to Andy's credit that he's looking at the bigger picture, for the benefit of the club as a whole. by making positive changes in helping young players thrive in a first team environment. Going by recent experiences, it is a risk which can prove fruitful, with the enthusiasm and fearless attitude of voungsters in Alloa colours having a positive impact on the pitch. Who knows, perhaps in time there may be one starlet who comes off the Recs' own conveyor-belt of talent and makes the club a tidy profit in the future?



DONALD HUNTER

Born: - 1st April 1955 Dumbarton

Donald Hunter will soon celebrate his 70th birthday, we look back on his career.

Donald's footballing career began with Dumbarton Castle Rovers near the end of the Sixties.

He then moved to Vale of Leven on 4th October 1972.

His first senior club was Glasgow Rangers signed by manager Willie Waddell on 18th January 1973. While on Rangers books Donald was selected for the Scotland Youth Squad and later that season won a Scotland Under 18 cap.

While at Ibrox Donald was understudy to both Peter McCloy and Stewart Kennedy. However Donald was to make four appearances for Glasgow Rangers, he made his debut at Ibrox against Queen's Park on 26th January 1974, keeping a clean sheet in an 8-0 victory, in the Third Round of the Scottish Cup. Ironically the Queen's Park goalkeeper that day was Ronnie

Lowrie who himself would join Glasgow Rangers and later Alloa Athletic.

Donald's first league match for Rangers in February 1974 was 3-2 home defeat to Arbroath. The following week he played in the league against East Fife at Bayview, keeping another clean sheet in a 3-0 victory. Donald's final appearance for Rangers was against Dundee United at Ibrox in a 3-1 victory.

After he left Glasgow Rangers, he signed for St. Mirren on 3rd June 1976, by a certain manager at that time Alex Ferguson. While at St. Mirren, Donald made 80 first team appearances under manager Alex Ferguson.

Donald's next move to his hometown of Dumbarton FC, signed on 26th June by Davie Wilson another ex-Rangers player. Donald was to play under Wilson and Sean Fallon at Dumbarton makes 30 appearances before Billy Lamont was appointed Dumbarton and Donald looked for a new challenge at Alloa Athletic.

Donald signed for Alloa Athletic on 27th August 1980 he was then to play his longest spell with any senior club. Donald made his debut for "The Wasps" on 29th August 1981 v. Forfar Athletic at Station Park. The Team that day was -Donald Hunter, Alan Wilde, Alex McKenzie, Bryan Purdie, Alan Holt, Andy Oliver, Arthur Grant, Larry Haggart, Colin Spence, Rov Mitchell & Ian Smith Subs: Robert McNab & lack Dunn. Although the team lost 1-2 that day in the final game of the season "The Wasps" returned to

Station Park and won promotion after Ian Smith's early goal past Forfar Athletic keeper Stewart Kennedy who had been at Ibrox in 1973 along with Donald. Donald was also in the Alloa Athletic team which defeated Dumbarton in the final of the Stirlingshire Cup to gain "The Wasps" the Stirlingshire Cup in the same season. Donald was ever present that season and recorded 16 clean sheets.

In Season 1982/83 Alloa Athletic were playing in the First Division but they were rocked when their manager Alex Totten moved to rivals Falkirk on 25th November 1982. Taking over the player manager role was centre half Willie Garner who had initially came on loan from Glasgow Celtic. Once again Donald was ever present in the Alloa goal and helped the team to finishing in sixth position in the First Division, the best the club has ever achieved, Donald made 11 clean sheets during the season.

Season 1983-84 was "The Wasps" second season in the First Division but they found it much tougher the second time round, the highlight was a 7-2 victory over Clydebank at Kilbowie Park which was to prove their only victory in the league during the season. Donald still managed 7 clean sheets during the season but Alloa after finishing bottom of the league were relegated. Donald only missed one game

that season on 28th September 1983 when Hugh Stevenson played in goal in a 4-1 victory at The Recs.

Season 1984-85. Donald only made 9 appearances under Jimmy Thomson, before taking up a position with Strathclyde Police in December 1984. Donald's last appearance for "The Wasps" on 22nd September 1984 v. Oueen of the South at Recreation Park in 1-1 draw. Ronnie Lowrie was then signed from Ballieston Juniors to replace Donald, another player who had also come through the ranks having started with Rangers. While with Strathclyde Police, Donald was capped playing for the Scottish Police International team.

This afternoon Alloa welcome title chasers. Cove Rangers, to the Indodrill Stadium for another crucial clash in the race for promotion. Like the hosts, Cove are five unbeaten in the league and their 2-1 victory over Dumbarton last Saturday was enough to see them move to 1st in the league. Arbroath's defeat at Stenhousemuir meant that Paul Hartley's side went to the summit on goal difference. This is just another twist to the tale of promotion in this league, however, The Lichties game in hand though saw them retake their place at the top. Cove left it late

last Saturday with an 87th minute strike from Fraser Fyvie securing all three points against League One's bottom side.

THE BOSS PAUL HARTLEY

The opposing manager for Andy Graham needs no introduction in Paul Hartley. The former Scotland midfielder began his managerial career at Alloa and was at the heart of some of the club's most successful moments. Winning the old Division 3 in his first season in 2012 was followed by promotion from this division in the play-offs just a year

later. Hartley departed Alloa with them in 4th in Scotland's second tier, quite the contrast to the club he took over. Since then Hartlev has had two spells at Cove Rangers, as well as Dundee, Falkirk and Hartlepool United. Having been promoted out of this division multiple times, most recently his league winning Cove team in 2022, he will be looking to add another accolade to his strong lower league managerial CV.

THE CAPTAIN - MITCH MEGGINSON

Cove Rangers' captain, Mitch Megginson, is another man who has







spent part of his career here in Alloa. The Aberdonian has been a prolific striker in the lower leagues for many seasons and will be remembered fondly past his playing days at the Balmoral Stadium. Megginson did begin his career at Aberdeen and spent a few years out on loan, of which Alloa were one of his destinations. In 2016, he made the permanent switch to the Indodrill but departed the same year to Cove Rangers where he has been ever since. Having scored over 200 goals now for the club, Megginson has been the heartbeat of a squad that won the Highland League twice, League One and League Two. This season has been no. different as he currently sits on 12 goals in all competitions, with

11 of those being in the league, it does make him the division's top scorer.

ONE TO WATCH -FINDLAY MARSHALL

Cove Rangers continued their strong connection with Premiership outfit, Aberdeen, by signing both Findlay Marshall and Adam Emslie back in August. Marshall is the man The Wasp programme has selected as one to keep an eye on, however, both youngsters have had strong seasons. Marshall, 18, arrived at Aberdeen's Youth Academy at Under-12 level, and is currently entering his third year as a fulltime professional having agreed a deal to remain at Pittodrie until at least 2026 last season. Playing

in the heart of midfield for the visitors, Marshall has grabbed seven goals and assist from the centre of the park. On the current five unbeaten run, Marshall has played a key part with three strikes during that time.

THE CONNECTION

Two returning faces in Paul Hartley and Mitch Megginson have been covered already. They aren't the only ones returning to their former club though. Michael Doyle, a modern-day hero for the Wasps, makes his return to the club. Doyle was one of Harley's first signings back in 2011 and played an integral role in the club's rise through the

divisions. The right-back made a brief return to Alloa joining the club on loan in 2023 before making the permanent switch to the Balmoral Stadium. Also returning is Quinn Coulson. The winger departed Alloa in the summer for Arbroath, however, after limited gametime joined fellow League One side, Cove, on loan in January. Morgyn Neill and Miko Virtanen face up against their former side too this afternoon. Neill, following last week's dramatic winner, will play the side he joined Alloa from back in 2023 following two years at Cove. Virtanen spell

was shorter having joined the club in January 2023 and departing for the Wasps that summer following Cove's relegation from the Championship.

PREVIOUS MEETINGS

This is the side's third meeting against one another and both the fixtures previously this season have been identical scorelines. The first game back at the start of October saw Cove, as the visitors, come out 2-0 winners. Connor Scully and Fraser Fyvie's strikes put Cove in a strong position in the first half.



In The Premier Division, leaders Aberdeen stretched their advantage to six points, thanks to a 2-0 home win v St. Mirren. a result which also extended The Dons unbeaten league run to sixteen games. But second-placed Celtic's title hopes suffered a setback, when they went down 1-3 at Dundee United, who thus remained in third spot. Fourth-placed Rangers, held 0-0 at home by Hibs, still made it thirteen league games without defeat, while Hearts retained fifth place, after a 2-1 home win v struggling Motherwell. This setback left The Well anchored to the foot of the table, five points adrift of safety,

and seemingly doomed for the drop, as they'd now won just once in sixteen league matches. At Muirton Park, a crunch relegation clash took place between second-bottom St. Johnstone and third-bottom Dundee, the home side emerging successful by 1-0. And while they remained in second-bottom position, The Saints were now just a worse off than their Tayside rivals, though The Dee had two games in hand.

Morton retained leadership of The First Division, after 2-0 victory at relegation-haunted Raith, while Dumbarton were now second, after they were

also triumphant by 2-0, at home v Falkirk. The Sons displaced gameless Partick, who thus dropped to third, fourth-placed Clydebank shared two goals and the points at Clyde, while fifth-placed Brechin were 2-1 winners at struggling Airdrie. At the other end of the table, bottom club Alloa's relegation fears increased, after a 1-2 defeat from Meadowbank Thistle, Bobby Harris netting for The Wasps. who'd lined up as follows: Donald Hunter, Bobby Harris, Larry Haggart (Garry Thompson), Bryan Purdie, Davie Martin, Davie Houston, Drew Paterson, Lennie McComb, David Lloyd (Robert Quinn), John Weir, Cole.

Thus Alloa now trailed safety by five points, and as they'd won just once since the turn of the year, & with games starting to run out, it seemed they faced a real battle to remain in The First Division. Raith's own defeat left them also in a rather precarious position, four points worse off than Airdrie, who slipped to third-bottom spot, following their reversal v Brechin.

Second Division table-toppers Forfar had to settle for a point from a goalless home draw v Oueen's Park, though thev still held a rather comfortable seven-point lead over second-placed Queen of The South, who overcame another of the promotion challengers. Berwick. by 2-1 in a crucial clash at Palmerston. Third-placed Arbroath maintained their own promotion push with a 1-0 win at lowly East Stirling, while Stirling Albion remained fourth in spite of a 0-3 home defeat v Stenhousemuir, who thus moved up to sixth. Berwick, in spite of their loss, remained in fifth spot, though

East Fife, held 1-1 at bottom club Montrose, dropped one place to seventh.

South of the border, First Division leaders Liverpool, held 1-1 at local rivals and Milk Cup Final opponents Everton, saw their lead reduced to two points over second-placed Manchester United, who triumphed 3-0 v Aston Villa at Villa Park. Nottingham Forest, beaten 0-1 at their bottom-of-the-table Midland rivals Wolves, still retained third spot, though Wolves, in spite of their welcome success, only their third in the league at home all season, still looked more or less certain to take the drop.

In The Second Division, Chelsea's 3-0 home success v struggling Oldham, enabled them to regain top spot, albeit on goal difference from Sheffield Wednesday, who were 1-0 winners at Yorkshire rivals Barnsley. Newcastle, despite being held 2-2 at Fulham, still moved up one place to third, while Manchester City, 1-0 home winners v Shrewsbury, were now fourth.

Barry Ferguson's tenure at Alloa was anything but dull. While his 27% win rate—courtesy of our in-house stat guru Jonathan—shows a difficult season, there were still some memorable moments (for better or worse).

A Season of chaos and drama Ferguson's time in charge was fiery from the start. His approach to squad management was... let's call it bold. He oversaw extensive recruitment, bringing in a host of new faces to reshape the squad. However, this led to club legends being frozen out, creating tension in the dressing room and among fans. His confrontational style extended beyond the dressing room too, with heated exchanges with supporters,

By Christmas and New Year, what was meant to be a season

of title contention had completely unraveled. Instead of a promotion push, Alloa found themselves struggling for consistency, with damaging defeats piling up. It all culminated in heavy losses to Falkirk and East Fife, which ultimately prompted Ferguson to resign, citing the need for "fresh impetus."

While the season didn't go as planned, there were still some moments that stood out:

Alloa on the International Stage: One of the most unexpected yet brilliant stories of the season was Fernandy Mendy's call-up to the Guinea-Bissau squad for the African Cup of Nations. While some might scoff at its importance (looking at you, Jamie Carragher), we're definitely chalking it up as a major competition. Alloa being represented on an international stage—no matter how indirectly—was a surreal but proud moment.

Now, with Ferguson back in the dugout at Rangers, who knows what chaos might unfold next? Ferguson's reign might not have been all smooth sailing, but you couldn't fault the biggest game of the season: Alloa's Scottish Cup tie against Celtic on January 22, 2022. The Indodrill Stadium was buzzing with an almost capacity crowd of 3,022.

Celtic took an early lead in the 14th minute, thanks to Georgios Giakoumakis deftly converting a cross from Liam Scales. Just before halftime, Liel Abada doubled their advantage with a stunning 25-yard strike. However, Alloa's Conor Sammon reignited hopes in the 78th minute by heading in a cross from Jon Robertson, making it 2-1. Despite a spirited effort, Alloa couldn't find the equalizer, and the match concluded with Celtic advancing to the next round.

Just a bit too spirited at the end from Mouhamed Niang, who absolutely went for it with a late, studs-up tackle on Celtic's Yosuke Ideguchi. It was the kind of challenge that, if it happened in the 1980s, would've been called "good, strong defending." In modern football? Straight to the naughty step.

Referee Don Robertson didn't hesitate to brandish a red card, sending Niang off in the dying moments of the game. Celtic boss Ange Postecoglou was not amused—especially since Ideguchi ended up injured from the tackle. Don't think Celtic will be relishing the next Old Firm. to be honest!

The 'Full-Time Football' Pipeline Continues: Ferguson's departure continued a bizarre trend at Alloa: managers leaving and later finding themselves in fulltime football. Jack Ross > St Mirren Jim Goodwin > St Mirren Peter Grant > Dunfermline Barry Ferguson > Now taking interim charge of Rangers after a three-year absence Brian Rice > Assisting at Championship-chasing Livingston It's safe to say that Alloa seems to be some sort of springboard—even for those who had, let's just say, mixed results

Although after this unexpected appointment we're looking forward to Andy Graham taking over at Real Madrid when his Alloa career winds up.
